**SICK AND HOMEBOUND:** Please notify the Rectory if anyone in your home is seriously sick or homebound.

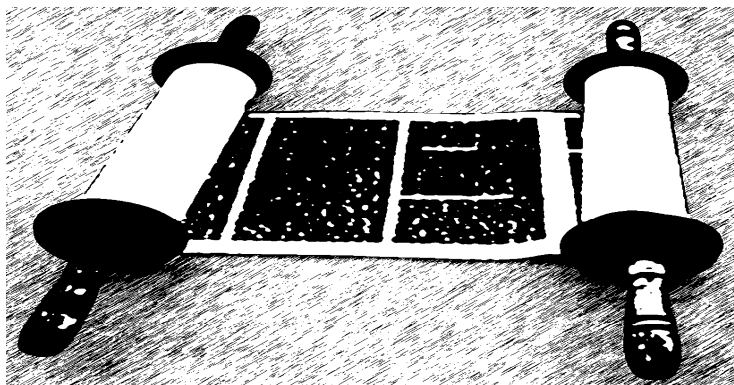
**PARISH REGISTRATION:** All families or individuals who have moved into the parish should register by filling out the registration card available at the church doors.

share eternal life with you.*

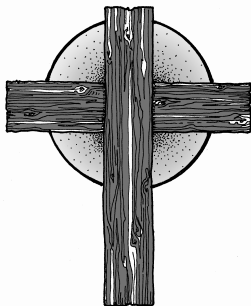
*Comfort those who mourn the death

## **GOD'S WORD, A LAMP FOR OUR FEET**

*Both today's Gospel and the reading from Nehemiah remind us that the word of God found in the Torah, the proph-ets, and the writings of the Old Testament has been an ongo-ing source of conversion, wisdom, encouragement, and self-understanding for Israel. Jesus, too, came to understand his mission through the words of Isaiah. This same word speaks to us in our day.*

### **INSIDE THE READINGS**

The mission of Jesus in Luke's Gospel is to provide the peace that the suffering need and that only God can give. The Roman Emperor Augustus had initiated a period of time that was hailed as the *Pax Romana* or "Roman peace." He took upon himself the titles "Son of God," "God," "Redeemer," "Lord," and "Savior of the World," among others. Augustus also took care to promote through monuments the peace he had brought. Despite the relative infrequency of wars, the Augustan peace did not deliver the needy from many of their needs nor did it fulfill the deepest yearnings of people. According to Luke, God comes in Jesus to address these primal needs and desires. The angels who announce Jesus' birth to the shep-herds sing, "Glory to God in the highest / and on earth peace to those on whom his favor rests" (Luke 2:14). This peace appears to draw upon the Hebrew concept of *shalom*, which is not simply the absence of strife but also includes a fullness of life. Today's Gospel presents the first words that the Lukan Jesus speaks at the beginning of his ministry. Unlike the Gospels of Matthew and Mark, this message is not expressed in terms of the coming of the reign of God (Matthew 4:17; Mark 1:15). Rather, Luke adopts words from the prophet Isaiah "to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord" (Luke 4:18-19). In other words, the time that is truly significant is not the epoch initiated by Augustus Caesar but that initiated by God in Jesus. There are always many proclamations about the goods that come to us. Only one good from one Source, however, fulfills our most basic and important needs.

### **THOUGHTS FOR ACTION**

When Ezra read from the book of the law of God, explain-ing it so the people could understand, they wept, but he said to them: "Go, eat rich foods and drink sweet drinks, and allot portions to those who had nothing prepared; for today is holy to our Lord. Do not be saddened this day, for rejoicing in the Lord must be your strength!" (Nehemiah 8:10). Ask God to let the divine word bring joy to your heart.
